For which position are you running? Senior Warden

How and when did you become a member of St. Andrew's?

I became a member of St. Andrews shortly after our daughters were born (Anna b.1985 and Emma b. 1987) as I felt a need for a supportive faith community to help raise our children. At the time, 'it takes a village' was a popular phrase. I visited St. Andrew's and soon realized I had found our village.

Briefly describe your background and history with the Episcopal Church.

I participated in an Episcopal 101 (the class name escapes me) primarily to learn more about the church. When I felt comfortable with what I knew I was formally received into the church. I

have served as a Sunday school teacher, vestry and Altar Guild member, lector/usher, and for the past two years, senior warden.

What strengths, talents and experiences will you bring to this position?

I retired one year ago from the UW School of Medicine and Public Health where I was director of the Master of Genetic Counselor Studies program. This position required organizational and management skills and keeping track of requirements in multiple systems (hospital systems, national accrediting bodies, university requirements etc.). In addition, as a student mentor and clinical genetic counselor I have honed my listening skills which helps me bring together individuals to achieve a common goal. These same skills have helped me grow in my role as senior warden and to be ready for another term.

What issues do you think are a priority for St. Andrew's?

Two years ago I wrote- "Having been part of the Mission committee and facilitating parish listening groups suggests our community cares very deeply about two issues-one is being back together and recharging our parish after the isolation of COVID 19 restrictions and two-the social justice issues and disparities made more evident by the pandemic and growing acts of violence against marginalized groups (especially people of color). I don't see either of these issues as more important than the other, but rather synergistic i.e. the efforts each requires will support the other." This has not changed. We continue to gain energy around these issues through support of each other and strengthening our relationships.

For which position are you running? Junior Warden

How and when did you become a member of St. Andrew's?

We have been members of this parish for 7 years. We came to St. Andrew's from St. James ELCA in Verona as a homecoming to my wife's tradition. The warm environment mixed with strong liturgical tradition made it a perfect match for us.

Briefly describe your background and history with the Episcopal Church.

I only became a member of the Episcopal Church when we became members of St. Andrew's, and I was confirmed by Bishop Lee in May of 2022. I have had a long history of being active and

deeply interested in the church, worship, and theology. I grew up in the Christian Reformed Church and, since moving to Madison, have been a member of two different strains of the Lutheran church-Missouri Synod and ELCA.

What strengths, talents and experiences will you bring to this position?

I joined the Vestry in 2021 and have served as Junior Warden since 2022. I served on the church council at St James ELCA in Verona for 6 yrs, 5 of which I served as president of the council. I currently serve as treasurer for a local arts organization. What issues do you think are a priority for St. Andrew's?

As St. Andrew continues to understand its role and mission in a post-pandemic world, how we use the space and our resources surrounding that space is important for living out our mission.

For which position are you running? Diocesan Convention Deputy

How and when did you become a member of St. Andrew's?

In 2016 I decided to explore Episcopal churches in the area and settled on St. Andrew's immediately – I was drawn in by the sense of welcome, care and acceptance; by the powerful, meaningful sermons, and by the music ministry. I became a member right away and have been singing with the choir since then. I am also a member of the Vestry (second year.)

Briefly describe your background and history with the Episcopal Church.

I was born to two Episcopalians, but my father was in the military so we were always moving and attending a different church. When I was 11, we settled in Arlington, VA for five years, where I had my first experience with a real home church. I was confirmed there at St. Michael's at age 12 and in 2017, I went through confirmation classes again here at St. Andrew's, some 45 years later. I wanted to get to know the Episcopal Church better as an adult, and I wanted to commit to it with all my heart and soul and of my own volition.

What strengths, talents and experiences will you bring to this position?

For which position are you running? Diocesan Convention Deputy

How and when did you become a member of St. Andrew's?

I became a member of St. Andrew's in June 2013. I was looking for a church home for myself and my son, then going into second grade. I checked out the St. Andrew's website, saw the announcement of Mother Dorota's first service, attended, and never looked back!

Briefly describe your background and history with the Episcopal Church.

I was raised Roman Catholic. I began attending the Anglican Church of St. Andrew's in the heart of Moscow in the 1990s. When I came back to the US to take up my first job as an assistant

professor, I attended the Episcopal Church of the Good Shepherd in Athens, Ohio. There I served on the Vestry, as a chalice bearer, and on a discernment committee, and I sang in the choir. I felt very much at home there. I feel just much at home here at St. Andrew's. I have served one three-year term on the Vestry (2017-19), served for three years on the Stewardship Committee (2020-22), and have been teaching the younger kids (4K through Grade 1) in Sunday School for several years. For the past two years I have been scheduling volunteers for service at our Sunday worship. I was Diocesan Convention Deputy in 2022 and in 2023. I thoroughly enjoyed that experience and would be happy to repeat it.

What strengths, talents and experiences will you bring to this position?

I enjoy working collaboratively. In addition to teaching at UW-Madison, I am president of a national professional organization whose leadership works closely together, I am co-director of a federally funded program for Russian language learners, and I serve on departmental and university committees. So I participate in meetings and national conferences frequently and work with colleagues daily. I enjoy meeting new people and learning from others. I enjoy administrative work as well as teaching and learning. I like to think that I am organized and a good listener, and I focus on hearing all sides equitably and finding consensus. What issues do you think are a priority for St. Andrew's?
