For which position are you running? Vestry

How and when did you become a member of St. Andrew's?

I started attending St. Andrew's after I moved to Madison's near-west side in 2009, drawn to its neighborhood location and to the inclusive welcome and open-minded acceptance I encountered in Fr. Andy and the late archdeacon Susan Mueller – not to mention the camaraderie I found in the Wednesday morning Eucharists and post-worship "holy bagel hours" that happened here back then. Over the years I've been able to participate in some Outreach Committee efforts and take advantage of racial justice learning opportunities, and a decade ago I had the personally transforming experience of being in a small discernment group

for a member considering a call to ministry. I was a diocesan delegate during the pandemic (in the early Zoom era), when we approved the interim leadership of Bishop Jeff Lee.

Briefly describe your background and history with the Episcopal Church.

The child of a Baptist minister descended from Mennonites, I was a high-school Jesus Freak and a college evangelical in the 1970s. In the 1980s I started to experience and explore the Episcopal Church at another St. Andrew's – in Ann Arbor, Michigan – and was confirmed there. In the early 1990s I lived in Seattle, where I was a member of St. Mark's Cathedral, helped lead its middle-school youth group, attended the diocesan lay seminary for a semester, and then felt called to some years of what I'd describe as important spiritual wandering.
